

John Smedley’s mill at Lea Bridge was the one originally built by Peter Nightingale in the early 1780s, and acquired by John Smedley some years later. Hear the full story, recounted by the Archivist of this famous early cotton mill and historic company.

Monday 10 September, 7.30:

Bob Gellatly: “The Tennessean: a journey from Washington to Memphis”

Bob’s presentation is about a journey he made in August last year, tracing the route of the famous Tennessean railway. An added bonus is that this coincided with the solar eclipse which occurred during the journey.

Cliff Lea: “The Centenary of the Chesterfield area oilwells—Britains first oilfield of 100 years ago.”

It was in 1918, just as WW1 was drawing to a close, that Britain’s first systematic oil exploration took place, and the first oilwells were sunk close to us. Hear about the famous Tibshelf well spudded in 1918, about Britain’s first “fracking” which took place at Heath later in 1922, and about the first oil industry related death which sadly took place so close to home at the well on Brimington Common.
