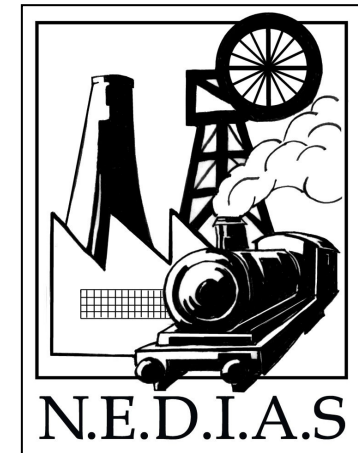

## Monday 11 November, 7.30

Tony Hill: **“Strutt’s North Mill - Why are Belper and the Strutts so important to the World Heritage Site ”**

The original North Mill, completed in 1786 by Jedediah Strutt, was destroyed by fire in 1803. Its replacement was built in 1804 by his son, William, on the foundations of the old mill and is one of the oldest surviving examples of an iron-framed ‘fire-proof’ building in the world. Hear more about the Strutts and their Belper mills.
